DigiMeet is a virtual networking event for doctoral researchers, organised by the Bavarian Research Institute for Digital Transformation (bidt), the Center for Advanced Internet Studies (CAIS) and the Weizenbaum Institute (WI). Its special topic for 2021 is "sustainability in digital transformation: charting new terrain, exploring tensions".

The event will start with a keynote by Ortwin Renn (IASS Potsdam) on "digitalisation and sustainability: friends or foes?"

The first part of the meeting is divided into five thematic sessions. Each session is chaired by experts from the convening institutions.

After a short introductory input by each chair, contributors will present their findings in a lightning talk, followed by a quick q&a. Each session will be concluded by a joint discussion amongst participants and the audience.

The second part of the meeting is dedicated to Open Spaces on Gather.Town or Zoom. The Open Spaces are used for oral presentations, poster sessions, group discussions or any other multimedia or interactive purpose.

The event will finish with a keynote by Elisa Lindinger (SUPERRR Lab) on "imagining the Internet as a park".
